As many of you know, the Sullivan Website had a fatal injury several months ago. All the work of Bob Switzer was lost. After much work and many phone calls, Bob declared the site gone. It became a Selectman's project to figure out what they were going to do. Your phone calls and emails made it clear a website is needed, so they went to work.

The result of that work, the new website, [townofsullivannh.com](http://townofsullivannh.com), is open for you to browse, utilize and comment upon. It is different from the previous site, but the information is still there and more is coming. Town calendar, breaking news, tax maps, property tax kiosk, town codes, forms & applications and many other useful tools are available. While you are using the new site, if you find a typo or something is not where you expect it or is missing something, please send them an email. Put the word "Website" in the subject line and mail to [townofsullivan@myfairpoint.net](mailto:townofsullivan@myfairpoint.net). The new site is not complete, as some things are still missing, but it is quickly coming together. As they head to the finish line, you may see colors change, photos change, maybe some headers or things that aren't working.

One feature they are very pleased to implement involves the use of Responsive Design. This means the site will adjust size and format to fit any size device - from a small phone to a 12" iPad to a full size computer. Go ahead and try it out. No buttons to push; just open the site on your phone and then open it on your tablet.

## **From the Archives**

(Why does “Ellisville” appear on so many maps?)

Summer always manages to catch up to me before I've had a chance to write the Newsletter article. So, I beg your indulgence as I “recycle” a previous article. When one looks at a comprehensive map of Sullivan, one finds two villages—Sullivan Center and East Sullivan—within our township. However there is also noted a village called Ellisville. This is usually pinpointed at the junction of Valley, Cross and Boulder Roads; however, that would be incorrect—more on that later. If one stands at that junction today, one sees the ruins of a dam and a single house. That is hardly the makings of a settlement. If one looks to the east, you will see the trace of another road (Warren Road) marked by parallel stone walls, which means that the junction was once much larger. Still, what was Ellisville that it should rate a place on the map?

The first mention of Ellisville was probably on the 1858 map of Cheshire County by Lawrence Fagan. Unlike the modern location, Fagan spread Ellisville across the landscape to encompass not only the junction mentioned above but the territory extending east to Otter Brook. Fagan spent almost two years wandering about the county to draft his map. He showed the roads and all of the farms and houses as he carefully labeled each owner. He identified all of the little villages in each town such as Unionville in Swanzey, Howeville and Bowkerville in Fitzwilliam and Lowellville in Marlborough, which later became what we think of as downtown Marlborough. My favorite was a cluster of houses and a small woodworking mill located in southeastern Nelson called Mosquitoville. Probably Nelson was not too sad to see that part of town annexed to Harrisville in the 1870s.

What Fagan found in Sullivan was a community anchored on the west by the mill at the junction of Cross, Boulder, Valley and Warren Roads. The eastern end was the small cluster of farms around the mill on Otter Brook. The latter was run by the Ellis family. For Fagan this formed a small community within the larger town of Sullivan, and he named it after the Ellis family.

The first settlers in that area were James Comstock and his wife Lucy (Wilder) Comstock. They built one of the houses at the end of modern Ellis Road. They had no children so took in orphans, including Asa Ellis. Eventually Asa inherited the farm. He began operating the mill on Otter Brook around 1820. In 1825 he married fellow orphan, Lucy Rugg and they had two children. Their son, Atwell Comstock Ellis, eventually inherited the farm and the mill. All of these people would have met with Lawrence Fagan when he arrived around 1856 and noted their names on the map.

The western end of what Fagan called Ellisville was the home of a different family. A small mill was built there in 1816 as well as a house and blacksmith shop. In 1831 Jacob Spaulding purchased the mill, expanded its footprint, and built a house across the street. The mill functioned as both a saw and grist mill. Jacob Spaulding was part of the Spaulding family that was quite prominent in the early 19<sup>th</sup> century. They were lumbermen, sawyers, housewrights and finish carpenters. They could literally build you a house starting with trees standing in the forest. In addition to Jacob's operation, his brother Dexter ran a wheelwright shop a few hundred feet away on Boulder Road. When Fagan arrived in 1856 he found a prosperous mill, two houses, a blacksmith shop and a wheelwright shop at the junction. Combined with the Ellis family operation, this area looked to Fagan like a prosperous little village within the township—like Unionville, Bowkerville or Mosquitoville.

What Fagan documented in 1858, was the struggle of northern New England Hill towns to find a way to make a living. Agriculture was becoming more subsistence level as the cash crop business faded. The forests were coming back, as marginal farms had been abandoned 30 or 40 years before. Water power was abundant so farmers began supplementing their earnings with wood products. Mills sprang up wherever water could be dammed. Ultimately, with a few exceptions, the economy was not sustainable, and the little hamlets Fagan saw in 1858 began to disappear.

By 1920, all of the buildings at the junction of Cross, Valley, and Boulder Roads were gone. (The house that is there today, 1 Valley Road, was built in the 1950's.) The Ellis family eventually moved to Keene and found some prosperity there. Their mill continued under various owners until the mid-1920s.

Over 250 hundred years have gone by since Lawrence Fagan came to Sullivan. He must have been a sight. He was an immigrant from Ireland and was pushing an odd instrument mounted on a wheelbarrow to measure precise distances along the road. And, he asked a lot of questions as to who owned which houses and what sorts of occupations they were engaged in. His goal was to produce an accurate map of Cheshire County which he hoped to market and make enough money to pay his bills. In the process he documented a community with three villages—Sullivan Center, East Sullivan and Ellisville. So Ellisville remains on maps because of what Lawrence Fagan discovered there.

### **E-BOOKS ARE FREE THROUGH YOUR LIBRARY!**

One of the services that is offered at the Sullivan Public Library is Overdrive (or “Libby” on newer devices). This is for audiobooks as well as e-books and magazines. All you need to do is go to <https://www.nh.overdrive.com/>. Here you simply select Sullivan Public Library from the drop down list of libraries; and when asked for your code or library number, type 4386 plus your personal 3-digit library number. If you are uncertain what your number is, a librarian can either look it up or assign you a new number. **And, you can do this anytime in the comfort of your home!**

Did you know that the Library has **three different book groups** that would love to have new participants? It's true. Come on in and check them out!

The **First Tuesday Cookbook Group** meets at 12:30 on the first Tuesday of the month to taste the recipes from the cookbook that were tried out that month. You can critique the book, and see if it's one that should be added to the Sullivan collection.

The **Second Saturday Book Group** meets on the second Saturday of the month to discuss the mystery novel that they have read.

The **Third Thursday Book Group** reads thought-provoking books from both the fiction and non-fiction genres.

When you have time, it would be greatly appreciated if you could stop by the library and make sure your contact information is accurate. That would help out immensely.

Libby used 2 small disposable aluminum loaf pans, but you can use whatever you please. The original recipe called for the batter to be baked in coffee cans. ### Zucchini Bread

2 cups flour	1 tsp. salt
2 tsp. baking powder	2 cup sugar
3 eggs	3 tsp. vanilla
3 tsp. cinnamon	1 c. vegetable oil
1 tsp. baking soda	2 c. ground zucchini
Optional: nuts or raisins may be added	

Mix eggs, sugar, vanilla and zucchini, then add the rest of the ingredients. Grease your baking pans and bake at 350° for 1 hr. (This bake setting is for using the 2 small disposal aluminum loaf pans.) ENJOY!
